When I entered the Master of Arts in Educational Technology (MAET) program, my goals were to improve my personal understandings related to technology designed to assist learning in the classroom, gain a better grasp of important concepts in the field of education, and find a way to merge my previous studies in business administration with new knowledge gained in the MAET program. I had been teaching ESL in China for around six years and had acquired many strategies for creating better learning conditions for students.
